### A Statement from CAWP

"We have been stunned this week in the wake of the horrific murders in Georgia. But not surprised. The confluence of racism and misogyny has long been a potent recipe for violence, and the specific forms of otherization and fetishization of Asian women in our society created the toxic environment that led to this moment. We are infuriated that this same toxicity means that we know more about the life of a white, male murderer than we know of the lives that he destroyed.

At this moment, we are grateful for the voices of the Asian women in Congress and other elected offices that are forcefully denouncing anti-Asian racism. Our democracy, our country, is made better by their presence in the halls of power, not just in this moment when their voices move our hearts to understanding, but in all the ways their work improves our society for all Americans." <u>Read more</u>.

## Professor Farmer Spoke on *News 12 New Jersey*'s "Power and Politics" About Anti-Asian Rhetoric And the Georgia Attack

"It's part of a larger pattern that the Miller Center detected a year ago of sinophobic, anti-Asian rhetoric on social media. This is another example of how these social media engines drive extremism and drive hate. The Asian community has been victimized tremendously by this," said Professor Farmer.

"We found that the anti-Asian rhetoric was still on social media, but it became a subplot of the larger conspiracy theories, like QAnon and others that were dominant during the election season. Once the election happened, and the disputed election happened, and the storming of the Capitol happened, the groups splintered. Now there is coalescing around something called 'The New World Order,' which has within its tent anti-vaccination and anti-Asian propaganda. This is the way the public square is working now and unless we clean it up, this kind of conduct and extremism is just going to get worse," said Professor Farmer.

### **Power and Politics**

*News 12 New Jersey's* Alex Zdan <u>interviewed</u> Professor Farmer on "Power and Politics" about the increase in domestic extremism.

"The unfortunate fact of our life right now is that our public square has become a cesspool conspiracy theories, hate rhetoric, false narratives about the stolen election, and all of those factors combine to put people at the margins ready to act... The use of memes on social media have become an organizing tool for extremists of all stripes," said Professor Farmer.

"Time has shown that there needs to be a closer look taken at the way information is delivered by social media. The use of commercial algorithms in the context of political speech has proven to be catastrophic. Congress needs to take a close look at that and see what they can do to put guard rails up," said Farmer.

#### Women's Voice in Politics Hasn't Been Fully Realized

<u>Rutgers Today</u> published an article featuring faculty members' reflections on Women's History Month. CAWP senior scholar Kira Sanbonmatsu wrote about women's voice in politics.

"The United States is experiencing a woman vice president, a woman speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives and record numbers of women in Congress and state legislatures. The 2018 and 2020 elections yielded unprecedented gains in women's candidacies and elections to office.

But challenges remain," wrote Sanbonmatsu.

### Will Cuomo's Scandals Pave the Way for New York's First Female Mayor?

<u>The New York Times</u> interviewed Debbie Walsh, CAWP director, about women in New York politics.

"While women have made strides in state legislatures and Congress, some voters still cannot picture a woman as president, governor or mayor, said Debbie Walsh, director of the Center for American Women and Politics at Rutgers University.

'When you're the place where the buck stops, there needs to be a sense of strength and authority,' Ms. Walsh said. 'That has been one of the challenges that women have faced — the stereotype that women aren't strong or tough enough.'"
